The Department of Pathology at the University of North Dakota School of Medicine and Health Sciences (UND SMHS) is recruiting innovative, academically oriented forensic pathologists in a unique regional forensic and autopsy practice. Our caseload is very manageable with approximately 400 autopsies shared among 4 – 6 pathologists. This is the fifth position at this office. There is strong comradery and congeniality within the office; we desire people who value a respectful and supportive workplace and help each other achieve personal greatness. An ACGME fellowship was just approved and will be combined with the opportunity for the fellow to obtain an MPH with an additional year of commitment. There is no general surgical pathology or hospital AP/CP associated with this position.
